### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Sri Akilandeswari Women's College, Wandiwash adhere to the wishes and vision of Pujyasri Swamiji Abedhanandha Saraswathi for uplifting the poverty, ignorant and innocent rural women folk.

Swamy Abedhanandha Educational Trust laid its footprints about 20 years back with challenging experiences and progresses.

### **STRENGTH:**

The support of the management and that of the staff has made the Institution to achieve a awesome reputation in the educational field. The management, staff and students stand as the strong pillars for the upliftment of the college. The latest methods of new teaching technology and the support given by the management to implement the same has helped the institution to achieve its goal.

Initially in 1995 the college started with three job oriented undergraduate courses and today the Institution is catering 10 UG courses, 9 PG courses and 4 M.Phil courses. Every year the management takes each and every step to satisfy the needs of the students and that of the public by means of starting new professional courses which has job securities for women folk. Accordingly the infrastructural facilities such as required class rooms, laboratories, furniture, etc. are increased so as to satisfy the needs. With regard to admission, the strength has been increasing so as to prove that this Institution has made the people to realize the importance of education.

The implementation of new technologies in teaching methods, automation of library and other library sources, attention given by the staff, etc. has contributed much to the development of the Institution. This, in turn has made students to achieve awards, ranks and medals from the University. These laurels has created an opportunity for campus interviews and many of the companies has visited the college to recruit various candidates for various jobs and today many the students are placed in well-said positions. Appreciation from the recruiters, personalities who have visited the college for various reasons and public is a strong evidence that the students of this college are well trained in ultramodern facilities provided by the college. Various development programmes are organised for all the students under various topics so as to motivate the students to achieve laurels and reputation.

The participation of students in extension activities through various clubs is yet another strength for the progress of the Institution. Social service activities to the society has created a great impact on the development of the college. The alumni association on its part as motivated the management and the students to aim for higher laurels. The link between the management and the staff, the principal and staff, the staff and the students, the management and the public, etc. has created a strong bond in the development of the college.

#### **WEAKNESS:**

Being a rural area, most of the students undergo school studies in their mother-tongue language and hence English knowledge cannot be expected from them as they enter into the college life. It is the main drawback that the faculty find much difficulties in training the students to face the current scenario. And the same is also felt in case of promoting consultancy.

In spite of placing advertisements in dailies for recruiting staff every year, the management receives minimum number of resumes who have completed Ph.D or NET/SET qualified candidates. Hence this has become major constraint in appointing qualified staff.

### **OPPORTUNITIES**

The management has created various opportunities to students at various levels. Academically, library facilities, internet facilities, technological updates in teaching-learning methodologies, laboratory facilities, industrial visits, invited lectures, workshops, etc. Apart from these, the students are motivated both mentally and physically by organizing personality development classes, counselling, conducting yoga classes and sports. They are permitted to participate in various extra-curricular activities at college and inter-collegiate levels. Various clubs are functioning for the betterment of the students which enhances the social responsibilities.

The staff –members are also taken care in improving themselves in their academic achievement by means of creating opportunities to participate in various conferences, seminars and workshops conducted in various institutions and universities. Orientation programmes are organized by the management so as to enable the staff to enhance their teaching skills. As the institution has been granted with 12(B) status, the staffs are motivated to undergo projects at UGC level with financial aid. In order to satisfy the norms of the UGC, the staff members are encouraged to appear for CSIR/NET/UGC exams and provisions of all sorts to get through in the same is done by the management.

The status of achieving 12(B) under the UGC Act has motivated the management to uplift the college in all aspects in forthcoming years.

### **CRITERION - I: CURRICULAR ASPECT**

### 1.1. Curriculum Planning and Implementation:

The core curriculum for UG, PG and M.Phil courses is designed by the affiliating Thiruvalluvar university-Vellore. Our curriculum is based on 'Choice Based Credit System' (CBCS) as per the university from the academic year 2008-2009.

Under this CBCS-system, our college offers 10 UG courses, 9 PG courses and 4 M.Phil courses in Regular Stream. A UG candidate must earn a minimum of 140 credits in VI semesters and PG candidate must earn 90 credits in IV semesters. Apart from Part-I-Tamil and Part-II-English, Core and Allied subjects, an UG student can choose one Non-Major Elective subject is included as a part of syllabus in order to acquire knowledge of other subjects also. 'Environmental studies', 'Value Education' and Softskills are additional papers for UG Candidates and 'Human Rights' is added for PG Candidates. The students are given berth to 'Extension Activities' like NSS, RRC, YRC, Sports, Leo, Fine Arts, Eco club activities, Consumer Club activities, etc.

Our Institution especially provides Soft Skill development courses such as "Computer Skills", "Spoken and Presentation skills" and "Personality Development Skills". The classroom teaching is supplemented with Seminars, Conferences, Projects and Industrial Visits.

# 1.1.1. State the vision, mission and objectives of the Institution and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders:

Sri Akilandeswari Women's College-Wandiwash is the outcome of the vision and initiative of the Founder and Chairman Shri.Ln.B.Munirathinam, whose ardent desire is to empower women of the rural and downtrodden areas of Tiruvannamalai District. The institution reflects the ideals of "Swamy Abedhanandha"

### **Our Vision:**

**Swamy Abedhanandha Educational Trust** has the clear vision to Empower Women and their Economic Status through Education and moral values.

### **Our Mission:**

To empower the women society by the right academic atmosphere, the best knowledge resources and the equal opportunity to develop knowledge and employability skills besides inculcating in them the values embedded in culture and tradition.

### **Our Objectives:**

- To inculcate the need of Higher Education to Women of all socioeconomic strata.
- To provide students with all available knowledge resources.
- To nurture talent in students and enable them to multifarious personality development.
- To create employability skills in all students
- To make positive difference to society through education

### **Implementation of Policies:**

- The "Vision" of the management is discussed with students and teachers in the General Meetings so as to make them realize as to why the institution has been established. The public are given awareness of the same by means of printing the vision of the college in prospectus.
- The ultimate motive of the Institution is to provide academic excellence to all students

- The transparency in functioning, equity in access and excellence in performance are the prime policies designed by the Management.
- The admissions is done as per the norms of the government and 'first come first serve' option is followed. All Students are given equal opportunities in all aspects without any discrepancies.
- The disabled candidates are treated equally and all facilities are provided for them so as to make them feel at ease.
- All knowledge resources are made easily accessible to all our students.
- The Staff and Students are encouraged to do research, minor projects at UGC level and the management provides all facilities to carry the same. Emphasis is given to publish articles in journals.

The Management has a vision to establish Research Departments in all existing departments in order to produce many research scholars and to create job opportunities for them.

Personality Development Classes, motivation counselling camps are regularly conducted so that the students enrich themselves to secure ranks and face the interview boards during online and off line interviews.

All the above is made known to all the stakeholders in the governing body meetings, to the Staff and Students in general meetings and assemblies and to the public through their wards.

## 1.1.2. How does the Institution develop and deploy action plans for the effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific examples:

In the beginning of every academic year, The Principal, HODs and other Faculty members collectively organise and discuss the "Action Plan" for that academic year. The Institution pays much attention to improve the resources and to enhance the standards. As the outcome of our objectives, the following implementation procedures are adopted.

### a) Sandwich Course:

This is one of the action plans that has been implemented to bridge the gap between the Higher Secondary School Education to Collegiate Education. All the First students are made to attend the Personality Development Classes organised by ASSET and the same helps them to overcome the fear of college life. Every Department is advised to conduct 10 days preliminary course to train the new comers to emulate as best learners.

### b) Language Learning Tuition:

Special contact hours are designed to cater Tamil Medium Students and Slow learners to improve their reading, writing and communication skills in English Language. The faculty members of English Dept. and final year PG students of English literature are arranged as teachers to motivate the beginners for in English. With this healthy practice, the Tamil medium students are taught to become familiar with English vocabulary.

### c) Intensive Remedial Classes:

Teachers have been advised in All Staff Meetings to give priority to remedial teaching for slow learners. The students who have arrears in University examinations are given extra attention and coaching is given to them to clear the same. Question banks are established in library and in departments and the same is discussed with the students during revision and suitable materials

are given to them to get through in all examinations. Class tests, slip tests, assignments and seminars help the students to improve themselves in their studies.

### d) Students Involved Committees:

Student Representatives are nominated in each class by the tutor and they take active part to carry all the activities. Student President from II PG and Student Vice-President from III UG are selected to carry on all the activities of the college. All the clubs have student representatives who in turn act accordingly.

### e) Students Involved Clubs:

Various clubs such as Leo, Eco club, Health and Hygiene club, Citizen Consumer Club, Fine Arts Club, etc. have been constituted in the college wherein students take active part in all the extra-curricular activities.

### f) Academic and Industrial visits:

Our students are periodically taken out to places like "Research laboratories", "Factories", "Industries" and "Workshops" to gain more practical knowledge and exposures. It is expected that these visits will motivate them to take up Research work in future as well as to enable them to acquire a wider knowledge and skills of what they study.

# 1.1.3. What type of support (Procedural and Practical) do the teachers receive (from the university and or Institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The University designs the curriculum and the Boards of studies are reviewed for every three years.
- The subjects and Syllabi boards periodically meet every year to revise and update the syllabi.
- The teachers are provided better opportunities to participate in "Orientation Courses", "Refresher Courses" and "Workshops".
- The Management also encourages the staff members to participate in seminars and symposiums in their relevant subjects.
- The Management also allots a substantial amount for every semester to acquire books and journals.
- The faculty members are allowed to access internet in their Departments.
- The college encourages teachers to use modern technologies in class rooms. Digital screens, Projectors, Visualizes are frequently used in the classrooms for projecting NPTEL Programmes.

# 1.1.4. Specify theinitiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency:

Since our Institution is a non-autonomous college, we strictly follow the Thiruvalluvar University curriculum. But wherever possible we adopt a positive impact by choosing some papers with major benefits to students.

### > Selection of allied, elective and non-major subjects:

The University gives a choice to select Allied papers, Elective Papers and Non-Major Papers and the same is selected after clearly analyzing as to which would be the best to the students under consultation with the management, principal and staff

- Curriculum delivery: NPTEL programmes were organized in Seminar Hall and ICT Techniques were used in Classroom Teaching.
- Regular Teaching Hours:

Each paper is divided into 5 units and the number of contact hours is framed as per the university norms. The planning to complete the syllabus is done by the heads of the Departments and the other faculty members. The lesson plans are recorded in the log books and the same is verified by the head of the institution.

> Testing and Evaluation:

Continuous Internal Assessment is done as per the instructions given by the University and apart from that monthly unit tests and slip tests are conducted by the staff.

- 1.1.5. How does the Institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as Industry, Research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?
  - Institutional Networking with Industry:
    Departments of Microbiology, Biochemistry, Physics and Chemistry take their students for Industrial visits to acquire more practical knowledge in their relevant subjects. The students are exposed to the production and marketing practices of Industries and encourage them to establish small scale industries.
  - Institutional Networking with Research Bodies:
    Our University has included the submission of Research projects in the curriculum for PG Students and M.Phil. Scholars. Students pursue their research with in-house resources and at times of necessary they approach certain Research laboratories for the sensitive analysis of samples.
- 1.1.6. What are the contributions of the Institution and / or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the university? (Number of staff members Departments represented on the Board of studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholders feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)
  - The Management, principal and staff members have a good rapport with the affiliating Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore.
  - The former Principal Dr.R.Pushpavalli was elected as the Syndicate Member of Thiruvalluvar University from 2009 to 2012 and being a syndicate member she has offered valuable suggestions to the University. She also served as a steering committee member and was responsible for making many plausible policy decisions. She has rendered a good rapporting service to the University and to various colleges for which she was appreciated. She served as a Vice chancellor (In-charge) during the year 2011 2012 and as created a history in the records of the Thiruvalluvar University and that of our College.
  - The authorities of Thiruvalluvar University established a good intimacy, mutual and reciprocal relationships. The College secretary Ln.M.Ramanan has been elected as the Academic Council Member of Thiruvalluvar University and he still holds the position. His involvement in the said position is very well applauded and is well appreciated by the other academic members. He has registered many fruitful suggestions to improve the curriculum and its standard.
  - Extensive changes in current and applied aspects were included in B.Sc. Zoology Department by the present Principal Dr.M.H.S. Mohamed Yacoob. He has served as the member of Board of studies in Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore during 2009-2012. Moreover he has also served as the Member of Board of studies in Zoology in D.K.M.

College for Women, Vellore during the years 2009-2012. In addition to that he was also nominated by the University to serve as 'Staff selection committee member' in few Educational Institutions.

- Ms.K.Padmalochana, Head & Asst.Professor of Biochemistry has served as the member in UG Biochemistry Board of Studies in Thiruvalluvar University during the year 2006 2009.
- Ms.Suguna.K, Head & Asst.Professor of English is serving as Chairman UG English Central Valuation Board since 2014.
- Mrs.J.Kalaimathi, Asst. Prof. of Biochemistry is at present serving as Member of Board of Studies in B.Sc. Biochemistry in Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore.
- Other Head of the Departments with valid suggestions from their co-staff also offer their valuable suggestions and feedback to their concerned UG and PG board of studies.
- 1.1.7. Does the Institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating University) by it? If yes give details on the process (needs assessment, design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed:
  - From the academic year 2011-2012 onwards we have constituted an agreement with "ASSET" Institute of Soft Skill Development to train our students for their personality development. The Soft Skill Trainers have developed special modules to train the students in life skills. They have aimed at developing multi-tasking skills among students.
  - The Department of Computer Science and Computer Applications offer a list of practical exercises which includes the basics of MS-Office and INTERNET.
  - The Career Guidance Cell and Placement Cell utilise these Computer updating programmes every year to suit the needs of different batches of students.
  - Yoga is offered in this institution as Diploma certificate course and PG course for the students to encourage them both physically and mentally. As part of the yoga curriculum the yoga students are taken to Azhiyar for Practical administration in Yoga.
- 1.1.8. How does the Institution analyze-ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?
  - Academic Registers:
    - The Registers are maintained where the CIA components are entered and monitored by the tutors of each class. The Heads of the Departments meticulously check these practices. Further the Principal reviews these registers every month.
  - > Classroom observation:
    - The teachers are constantly observed in classrooms by the Head of the Departments and by the Head of the Institution. The students are often invited to give their feedbacks about the classroom teachings. The complaints and grievances from students are sympathetically considered by the Principal. Then the teachers are counselled if the objectives are not met with. General English Language teachers have been advised to give so many reading, writing and speaking practices as feasible in to the classroom. Conducting Seminar classes by means of PPT presentation by PG students is in practice in our Institution.

Our Institution offers the following courses with the vision of increasing employability skills and to strengthen the standard of education.

Course on "Soft Skill Development"

- Personality Development course and Soft skill development course in collaboration with the 'ASSET' Institution is conducted in the campus.
- Course on Competitive Examinations:
- Our Institution has a tie up with the "ASSET". "BUDDHA IAS ACADEMY" is offerring free training to our Final year UG and PG students. This programme takes care of all competitive examinations. Special coaching classes are conducted frequently. Experts, resource persons and training personals from various coaching academy are invited to handle the classes. The retired professors of the coaching centres are also involved to train our students to perform well in the competitive examinations.

- 1.2.3. Give details on the Institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability:
  - As far as the academic flexibility is concerned the lateral mobility choice is not available to the students studying under CBCS system. The career guidance cell organises enrichment modules so as to help the students to advance to higher studies. Our college also offers particular training in aptitude, resume writing and communication skills and enhances the students to suit themselves for employability. UG candidates are motivated to continue the studies by giving counselling with regard to their future life. PG candidates are motivated to appear for UGC/NET/SLET exams and get themselves approved for teaching profession. The importance of appearing for various Government exams in inculcated to students and proper training and guidance is given to them to appear for the same.

The Institution comes under the category of "Self-Financing College" and conducts the unaided self financing courses.

# 1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the Institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

### Gender:

Being a Women's Institution gender discrimination does not prevail in this college. We invite women speakers to address women's issues and the concept of "Feminism". For example, every year "World Women's Day" is celebrated and awareness programmes are conducted regularly to create awareness on various issues pertaining to women.

### **Environmental Education:**

Thiruvalluvar University has included a paper "Environmental Studies" for the I year UG students in the curriculum wherein the challenges of globalization and eco-friendly attitudes

are well explained. The concept of sustainable development of "Biodiversity" and its coexistence in the Universe highlights the paper.

The "Eco-Club" of our Institution conducts series of programmes on climate change, global warming, dereliction of fertile land, devastation of forest resources and renewable resources. The students are encouraged to make "Green Earth".

### **Human Rights:**

The University has introduced Human Rights paper for I PG Students and as a part of it periodical meetings are conducted to create awareness on Human Rights and Women's Rights. Personalities are invited to address on various issues pertaining to human rights for women folk. Our consumer club also conducts awareness programmes on Consumerism.

## 1.3.4. What are the various value-added courses and enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

Prayer meetings are conducted very Friday wherein religious hymns are sung and sayings from Bhagavat Gita, Bible and Holy Quran is read by the students. The 150<sup>th</sup> Birthday celebration of Swamy Vivekanandha was organized in the College campus to create spiritual awareness among the students. The books on Swamy Vivekanandha were displayed for sale.

## 1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The Research Committee has recommended the staff members to submit their research proposals to funding agencies for minor/major projects.

Based on the feedback from the stackholders the internet facilities have been extended in library and in all departments. Students were allowed to access the same.

All staff members and PG students have enrolled themselves in INFLIB NET and the management has provided required facilities to carry the same.

As per the suggestions given from the external experts, NPTEL, Virtual lab, Live Video lectures via VYAS Channel, etc. have been exposed to the students periodically.

The Resource persons in different subjects are invited to deliver guest lectures and provide an enthusiasm to students on the contemporary developments in the subject.

Students' feedback is obtained on these classes and steps are taken to improve their efficacy.

The syllabus and curriculum are framed and designed by the affiliating Thiruvalluvar University and we follow the same curriculum by implementing the CBCS system with external and CIA marks and credits. Suggestions are intimated to the University at times of academic council meetings and board meetings.

### **Feedback from the students:**

Generally the students are advised to give their views on curriculum enrichment. Based on the feedback suggestions gathered from the students the requests are sent to the respective Board of studies.

#### Feedback from alumnae:

The suggestions from the members of Old student association are taken into consideration. We communicate to the university whenever we feel the syllabus needs to be revised or changed.

### Feedback from the Parents:

Suggestions from the parents to start Certificate Courses and Diploma Courses to their wards has been referred to the University and moreover steps have been taken to intimate the University to conduct Campus Interviews in the affiliated colleges.

# 1.4.3. How many new programmes – courses were introduced by the Institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses / programmes?

- ➤ 12 new programmes were introduced during the last five academic years.
- In the academic year 2010-2011, B.Sc. Chemistry, M.Phil. Mathematics, M.Phil. Biochemistry and M.Phil. Computer Science was introduced.
- ➤ In the academic year 2011-2012 M.Phil. Microbiology and M.Phil. Commerce courses were introduced
- ➤ In the academic year 2012 2013 M.A. English., and M.Sc. Physics., courses were introduced.
- ➤ In the academic year 2013 2014 B.Com.(CA) and M.Sc. Chemistry courses were introduced.
- ➤ In the academic year 2014 2015 M.Sc. Computer Science course was introduced.
- There is a steady increase of demand for M.Phil. courses and apart from that there is more demand for English Maths,, Commerce and Computer Courses at UG and PG level.

### **1.5.** Other relevant information:

#### > Transparent Admission Procedures:

Our college is situated in a rural village area of low literary levels. As there been a constant increase in the receipt of the Applications for various courses, admission is done on the basis of first-come-first-served and by adopting the Government rules on community criteria and University norms in admissions.

### **Catering to students from disadvantaged communities:**

Being a rural area, most of the parents belong to agricultural background and their income level is very low. At the time of admission, the situation of such parents are considered and the management sees that no student is neglected from getting educated and certain provisions are given by the management to the students who belong to lower income level.

### > Translating the curriculum into practice:

Our teaching methodologies translate the curriculum into simple components and it is basically remedial in nature though we do modify our method when we meet advanced learners.

It mainly focuses on the rules and regulations of our institution, eligibility criteria laid down by the affiliating University, fees structure, list of courses offered, special features, hostel and bus facilities.

Press and Media also proves to be a very good medium to propagate the information. Advertisement is given in prominent daily news papers which contain admission notice for the courses. Advertisement in all local TV channels is being telecasted. Hoardings are placed in important places which provides required information about the college and admission.

The institution distributes the pamphlets to the nearby higher secondary school students and public. The parents and alumnae are also recommend the institution for admission.

Transparency is maintained throughout the admission process. Our institution strictly follows the reservation policy of the State Government. Eligibility criteria for each course is followed as per the guidelines of the Directorate of Collegiate Education and affiliated University.



Admission committee prepares the rank list. But being a self financing women's college in rural area the admission is given to the candidates who are really interested in higher education even though they have secured minimum marks in HSC examination.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and Students profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Admission Review committee scruitinizes the applications received from the candidates and monitors admission is done strictly as per eligibility criteria specified by Department Of Collegiate Education.

# 2.1.5. Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

Our institution is established in one of the rural area of Thiruvanamalai district where education is low and income of the people is also comparatively low.

### **SC/ST & OBC Category**

Scholarship such as Adhidravidar welfare department, Government scholarship for BC and MBC, are recommended for our students. Measures are taken to receive their scholarship regularly so as to enable the students to utilize the same for their education. As a result there is a drastic increase from 45 to 110 students at present.

#### Women

Single Child Scholarship from Central Government and other community (Jain) based scholar ships are availed for eligible students.

### **Differently Abled**

Candidates who admitted under differently able categories are given all facilities including boarding and lodging. Measures are taken to see that such candidates are not given any sort of discouragement either by students or faculties. Utmost care is taken in case of such candidates and the management provides them all facilities.

### **Economically Weaker Sections**

Students of this rural area belong to lower income section as most of the parents are farmers who depend on monsoon. Since this is the rural area most of the students are from government schools wherein English knowledge is poor and hence they seek admission in colleges where they can cope up with their ability. Our management provides concession in tuition fees and time relaxation for paying the fees for such economically backward students.

### **Minority Community**

Minority scholarship by Central Government and farmer (Uzhavar) scholarship by the State Government are made available for eligible students.

### **Others**

Bus facilities have been made and steps are taken to cover the interior areas wherein private or Government bus facilities are not available. 30 buses are running across three districts almost covering all interior areas. This had made the parents feel satisfied with regard to their daughter's safety.

2.1.6. Provide the following details for various programmes offered by the institution during the last four years and comment on the trends. i.e. reasons for increase/decrease and actions initiated for improvement.

Every year the admission for UG courses is comparatively higher as the people have realized the importance of education. Of-late most of the candidates are first generation learners. The institution every year implements a new course which has professional importance whereas job facilities are scattered in almost all the sections.

Admission in PG courses mostly goes down as the parents prefer B.Ed., and they believe that seniority will help their daughters to seek postings in government schools. As this is rural area

75% to 80% of the parents prefer to see their daughter settled in family at the end of graduation. Due to poor socio -economic background parents prefer employment rather than higher education. In spite of counselling to above, admission in PG is comparatively less in PG departments.

#### 2.2. Catering to Student Diversity

### **2.2.1.** How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Differently abled students are given all facilities without differentiating them from normal candidates. The scholarship declared by the Government of India is utilized by those candidates. As per the Tamilnadu government Reservation policy of 3% of such candidates is provided admissions by the management. Every support is given to them through all possible modes.

2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

To bridge the gap between the Higher Secondary school education to higher collegiate education the new comers are trained with Soft skill development programmes, Language learning programmes, Intensive remedial measures etc.

Proper attention is given to the students regarding the utilization of library as a part of the study. Students are given time to use the library in the best way.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Orientation course is given to all first year students in order to motivate them to come out of the complex and shy in all aspects. Games and mental activities are conducted in such classes which enable the students to build up their mental abilities. They are also enriched with sufficient knowledge which helps them to face competitive examinations.

By means of entrepreneurship club, Eco club and Yoga, students are focused to promote on self employment, healthy environment and healthy mind. Practices are given to them by experts and at the end of the course they are trained to enrich themselves in the above.

Spoken English is developed by the means of English Communication lab. Students are motivated to read English Magazines regularly to improve their vocabulary skills.

Slow learners are given more importance and their skills are developed by the means of counselling, slip test, extra notes, extra coaching, revision etc.

Regular class test, Model Examination, seminars and Assignments are given to the students and result of the same is intimated to their parents and counselling is given to parents to motivate their daughters. The management encourages the students by means of awarding them with certificates proficiency prizes, medals, shields and gifts. This creates healthy competition among students which in turn makes all the students to develop themselves.

Carrier guidance cell is created and final year candidates are given much preference in preparing their resumes and to face interview board, coaching for competitive exams, workshops on latest computer technology like android etc. is given.

Regular placements are conducted every year. Efficient candidates are encouraged by the management. Both parents and students are given counselling to utilize such opportunity. Safety measures are taken by the management to invite reputed companies.

### 2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Being a Women's college, gender problem doesn't arise. Students are observed keenly by the faculties with restriction to their discipline in public and measures are taken to inform their parents if necessity arises and even students are advised to adhere strict discipline. They are given counselling by experts in this regard by quoting many examples of those who have faced difficulties by choosing wrong path at an early age. They are motivated about the importance of education and awareness is given to them as to how they have to face the society.

### 2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Every year workshops, seminars (National Conferences) are conducted within the campus in all the departments by inviting resource persons from various universities and colleges. Students are motivated to present papers and posters. Students are also taken to other colleges when such opportunities are given by other colleges. Industrial visits are organized in order to have broader idea about the course.

Various competitions are conducted within the campus and the best are selected to participate in intercollegiate competitions also.

2.2.6. How does the institution collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker section etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The tutorial ward system is implemented. It is the responsibility of the tutor to monitor their students and the management supports the tutors in all respective manners in order to maintain a perfect relationship between the tutor and students. The grievance cell is functioning wherein they are analyzed perfectly and steps are taken to rectify the grievances of the students. Certain problems which can be solved by the tutor are done immediately. At times the Head of the Institution and the management also monitor the students and see that a healthy environment is provided for the students to have a perfect education.

#### 2.3. Teaching Learning Process

### 2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Academic calendar is prepared with all important events such as functions, exams and holidays. Apart from the above the details regarding management, principal, staff and courses are also printed in the calendar.Important days are also highlighted in the calendar so as to enable the students to know about the same.

Subjects are allocated to staff members as per the work load norms depending on their experience and interest. Schedule is given to the staff members well in advance so that they prepare and organize the classes. Every year it is seen that the same paper is not alloted to the same staff, so that all the staff members are given chance to know about the entire syllabus of the department. Certain complicated papers which needs special attention is given to the experienced staff. Syllabus of the first year is mostly handled by senior faculties or Heads.

All the faculties prepare lesson plan for the month and it is the duty of the Head of the Department to see that the schedule is correctly followed and the same is submitted to the Head of the Institution at the end of the month.

The lesson plan is prepared along with the instructional hours and subject codes as per university norms. The faculties are expected to make alternative arrangement during their absence in leave application itself.

Learning process includes classroom lectures, demonstrations and practical, PPT, OHP and other related modes. Students are focused with group discussion and class room observation. Industrial visit are regularly organized with orientation to their subjects which in turn helps them to have wider knowledge in subject. Regularly slip test, model exams, continuous internal assessment, assignments and seminars are conducted and regular evaluation of the same is done by the concerned staff. The same is entered in the continuous assessment register. At the end of the semester, as per university instruction, Head and staff incharge decide the blue print of continuous internal assessment test and the same is authorized by the Principal.

#### 2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC has recommended to transit from conventional method to media centric method of teaching which includes utilization of National mission on education through Information and Communication Technology, National programme on Technology Enhanced Learning, Shakath Virtual Laboratory, Consortium for Educational Communication, Live telecast via Vyas Higher Education Channel under UGC - CEC, Educational multimedia research centre, Soft skill programme to improve the teaching learning process.

IQAC also has recommended tutorial ward system. The tutor is in charge for preparing the log book which includes the personal details, their academic performance, health etc. of all the candidates allocated to them. Every month a report is submitted to Head of the institution regarding counselling done to their students and how the students have developed with all aspects.

It is the duty of the tutor to monitor their wards with respect to the academic performance and give special attention to the students who are trailing behind in their studies by clearly monitoring the drawbacks. Accordingly she has to discuss with other staff members and see the student develops herself. Arrear candidates are motivated by the tutor and necessary steps are taken to clear the papers.

# 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The infrastructure of the college is well equipped with many computers for which internet facility is given. The entire science laboratories are well equipped with necessary equipments as per the syllabus. Students are motivated to present papers and attend conferences, workshops and seminars They are motivated to participate in various inter collegiate competitions.

The staff members are advised to be more interactive with the students in the classrooms. The interaction between the students should be in the form of raising and answering the question, discussions and debate. Leadership quality is developed among the students and they are motivated to lead their students.

The students are made to read on their own, write essays, develop their skills and their innovative talents are made to boost up.

Students are made to discuss by the means of group discussion and debate in relevant topic which in turn make all the students to come out of their ideas and suggestions. This enables a active participation.

Seminars, projects, presentations and models are done by the students with their own effort. Soft skills development classes are organized in order to make students to practice and learn how to face the interviews. Aptitude test and reasoning test are organized regularly either by tutors or by the subject orientated staff members in order to make the students active.

Students are given instruction on the importance of preparing notes either by means of library reference or by websites. Topics for seminars and assignments are carefully monitored for self learning. Usage of internet, NLIST and other relevant e-resources are highlighted for the usage for taking reference.

### 2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Students are encouraged for group discussion, literary debates and aptitude test by all departments. The management appreciates the students who participate in departmental activities and encourages them by issuing merit certificates and prizes during college day function.

The Fine Arts Association is formed in the college, and the steps are taken to analyze the talents of the students by organizing competitions.

Science exhibitions are conducted where in students display various models which are relevant to the given topics and the best is selected by invited resource persons from other colleges. Poster presentation and paper presentation on scientific topics is conducted regularly in accordance to National science day celebrations.

### 2.3.5. What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching?

Video lectures of NPTEL programmes are arranged periodically in the seminar hall.

Live video lectures from consortium for education and communication were telecasted regularly via www.webcast.gov.in/vyaslive under UGC - CEC.

National mission on education through Information and Communication Technology are implemented.

Animation videos and Practical demonstration were visually made available to the students through Shakshat Virtual laboratories.

Information and library network (INFLIBNET) facilities are made available for all students and staffs.

The faculties are instructed to take class more effectively by means of OHP and LCD Projectors.

English language lab is provided and all the students are instructed to attend the lab for a week and train language skills and pronunciation by means of head phones.

Apart from above mentioned facilities e-sources are available in the library. Both staff and students are motivated to access the e-journals, magazines and e-books.

Internet facility is provided in the library and the PG and Research students are permitted to access NET facilities for their research purpose.

#### 2.3.6. How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills?

The PG students are made to interact with staff members to discuss on various topics which are relevant to their syllabus and project. Paper presentations are expected from the students under the guidance of the staff. The management initiates steps to get ISBN numbers for the relevant presentation.

Demonstrations are given by the staff members of the science department for the usage of all equipment with regards to their practical.

All the departmental associations conduct regular seminar and workshop in order to enable the students to have a wider knowledge in learning environment the resource persons are invited and topics are selected in such a way that students are given a better idea to their higher studies.

### 2.3.7. Detail on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services provided to students?

The tutorial ward system plays an important role in the academic development of the students. They continuously support the slow learners and encourage them by the means of extra coaching and slip tests. The reappearing candidates are given more motivation to achieve success.

PG and Research students are encouraged to take classes for UG students which in turn will help them to overcome the stage fear. All the departments are asked to prepare study material and question bank and to circulate them to students, in order to ensure better results.

The institution is easily accessible with the parents and regularly parents are invited either to discuss about academic performance of the student or of their individual behaviour. At times counselling is given to parents also as most of the parents are uneducated. It becomes the responsibility of the staff members to see that the students not to go in a wrong path.

The management supports the parents who approach them for financial assistance.

The tutorial ward system enables to have a close relationship with the student and whenever a student needs assistance with regard to the personal problems and the same is rectified either by the tutor or by the Principal. Whenever the parent or student approach the head of the institution

to discontinue the studies, the head of institution and the management do their utmost best to see that the student continues her studies by giving all support.

2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The management has given as strong foundation by equipping all the labs with all sorts of equipments which are relevant to the syllabus. Atmost care is taken by the management to add more number of equipments for research purpose.

UPS and internet connections are given to computer labs.

Language lab is almost used by all the students to develop the communication skills.

#### 2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library is well equipped with all sorts of books, magazines and journals. Net facility is provided, staff and students utilize the net facility to activate e-journals, e-books and browsing is also available. Especially PG students and M.Phil scholars are advised to utilize the library for preparing notes.

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes'elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

We have not come across any difficult challenge in the past years in completing the syllabus.

#### 2.3.11. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The head of the institution gives regular visit to all the classes and monitor that classes are managed properly. The head of the departments are in charge to go rounds and record a report regarding the inspection of classes. Whenever the head of the institution finds fault that the classes are not taken properly the correct instruction is given to the staff members for smooth conduction of classes.

All the staff members are asked to submit the lesson plan regular test marks and counselling note to the head of the institution within the first week of every month. This helps the head of the institution to monitor the teaching learning process regularly.

When the university results are declared the management and the head of the institution meet the staff members to discuss their individual results and instructions are provided accordingly.

Grievance cell is adopted in the college and the head of the institution with four senior faculty members discuss and with the help of the management the same is solved. Monthly feed-back is invited from the students with regard to the teaching process. Regular conduction of test helps to evaluate the students and necessary steps are taken to rectify the weakness of the students by motivating the staff as to how they have to manage with students.

Advertisement is placed in all leading news papers in the month of March every year. Registered candidates are called for interview during the month of May. The recruitment committee selects the faculty by means of academic qualification, written test, demo and personal interview.

#### RETENTION

The management does not compel any of the staff members to resign. Resignation is accepted under voluntary basis. The management considers the staff as permanent and includes them for eligibility of provident fund. Every year increment is given. The management takes concern and care in the welfare of the staff. Certain staff members who are from distant places are given free boarding. Staff members who have completed ten months of service are eligible for vacation salary. Maternity leave facility is given for staff members. Staff members who are eligible for examinership are given 15 days of leave on duty. Permission is given for staff members who interested in attending seminars and conferences. They are even encouraged for doing research. Orientation program is organized by the management which enables a smooth relationship among all staff members.

2.4.2. How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.) Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

Necessary qualified teachers were appointed when and where it was required.

Our institution is a self financing college for women in Thiruvannamalai district. Staff members are encouraged to bring out their extreme talent and promote academic progress. **2.5.1.** How does the institution ensure that the stake holders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The first years are given instructions regarding the evaluation process of university and about CBCS pattern so that they will have an idea of how to face an exam and the same instructions are

also given by the tutors regularly. Class tutors also explain about the scheme of examination and prepare the students to face the University exams well in advance.

### 2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The university has introduced CBCS pattern under which the marks are splitted as an internal (25) and as external (75). The internal marks are given on the basis of regular test pattern, seminar and assignment suggested by the university.

Every month tests are conducted and the final test will be the model examination and the internal marks will be awarded. All the monthly marks are included in computing final internal marks (25). The evaluated answer scripts are distributed to the students and care is taken by all the staffs to discuss about progress of the students and also suggestion are given, how the student should answer.

The internal marks are finally sent to the university and the same is also intimated to the parents and sometimes parents are invited to discuss about the progress of the students with the head of the department.

### 2.5.3. How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The answer scripts are evaluated by the means of central valuation organized by the university. Valuation process is under taken by the short meeting by the Board members regarding the scheme of valuation. Board of members again meet to discuss about the passing percentage and also suggests to the university if any changes are to be done either in valuation process or in syllabus pattern. On declaring the result the institution along with its staff and students contact the university for certain discrepancy and if necessary or if the student felt that marks given to them is not up to their expectation, they are suggested either to apply for revaluation or for photo copy. The university in turn do their best for grievances.

### 2.5.4. Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Under formative evaluative system CIA marks are designed by the institution as per the university norms and the semester exams are considered to be the summative evaluation system.

The soft skill paper is mingled with the foundation paper and communication English is developed by the means of this process.

The above mentioned system had an impact in our institution by securing many university ranks as follows

### 2.6.3. How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

As the institution is in rural area most of the candidates are from Tamil medium and these students are given remedial teaching in order to make them successful. The staff members prepare themselves by using library sources well in advance and very rarely they depend purely on text books. Such preparation is passed even to students by means of study material. Sources such as library and internet help our students and staffs to acquire a sound knowledge about the syllabus.

# 2.6.4. What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The research students are given training to take classes for their juniors which enables them professionally in their future. Library and internet are well equipped for easy access of any syllabus. Apart from theoretical knowledge practical knowledge are imposed on students by the means of NME courses such as computer. Students are taken for educational tours to attain more knowledge of their syllabus. Training is also given to them by means of attending the workshops organized by various colleges.

Entrepreneurship cell is functioning within the campus. Necessary steps have been taken to develop the entrepreneurship skill among the students. Trainers are invited to give training to students in making handicrafts. Suggestions are given to students to design their own products and display them for sales. Research candidates are encouraged to do their research by which they can gain more practical knowledge.

### 2.6.5. How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Regular feed backs are collected from the students with regard to academic difficulties. Such feed backs are analyzed by the head of the institution and necessary steps are taken to rectify the problems mentioned by the students in their feedback. Personality development classes help the students to gain confidence and prepare themselves for better future. Training to prepare resumes, facing an interview etc. helps the students to see better employments.

Communication skill is developed with the introduction of soft skill paper along with foundation English. Teaching methodologies are suggested to the faculty members to adopt interactions among the students. The head of the institution along with the head of the department suggest ways for preparing question papers for internal assessments, evaluation method and other development skills. Changes are made whenever necessary. Head of the institution regularly monitors test and evaluation of the staff members by the means of submitting monthly report. Counseling is given not only students but also to the staff members in moulding the students.

#### 2.6.6. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Monthly tests, model exams and slip test are conducted and such marks are maintained in the registers duly signed by the head of the institution every month. University results are also maintained in the departments.

On declaring university result each department submit their result analysis to head of the institution and management who monitor the result and discuss about the result which are poor.

Staffs who have given poor results are called forward to analyze the reason for their poor performance. Instructions are given to staff members to prepare the students for arrear examination by giving special coaching.

# 2.6.7. Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

The institution motivates the student by awarding cash prizes who have secured more than 1000 marks in higher secondary level and seek admission for various courses. The best students who have secured good marks at higher secondary level are selected and they are motivated to achieve University Ranks. The performance of such students are monitored with the semester results. In case if the marks of such students have gone down in any of the semester, the reason for the same is analyzed and if the students have gained less marks due to personal problems, guidance is given to them to overcome those problems and the parents of such candidates are also invited and given counselling.

The management awards proficiency prizes for the best candidates in all the departments during the college day function. The university rank holders and students who have attained proficiency at college level are awarded with gold medals, endowment prizes and certificates during the convocation.

The slowlearners are sorted and they are given special coaching by means of slip test. The staff members are requested to prepare relevant study material and distribute them to the student who accordingly uses the same while preparing for examination.

Question bank is maintained in all departments. It is the duty of the staff member to prepare sufficient number of repeated questions and answers for the same is distributed to students. Slow learners are advised to follow the question bank so that their preparation for exam becomes easy.

The rapid multiplication rate makes Azolla ideal organic feed substitutes for livestock. Azolla as feed substitute shows that there is an overall increase in milk production by 15-20 percent by supplementing feed with the same quantity of the plant on dry weight basis without affecting milk production.

The National Service Scheme conducts meetings with volunteers and has planned what should be done further. The student leaders organize the events supported by the faculty members. The NSS has an annual camp in a village every year for 7 days. The Tamil Nadu NSS through the University NSS unit funds the college NSS unit. The fund is used for NSS activities.

Youth Red Cross collects 20 rupees per student annually for its activities. Annual membership amount of 8 rupees per student is paid to Indian Red Cross Society. The balance amount is used for YRC activities conducted in the college.

The Citizen Consumer Club conducts orientation for schools to create awareness. The CCC is funded by the college.

The Red Ribbon Club plans its activities based on the written instructions sent by the University NSS Coordinator. It is mandatory that all activities defined by the Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society are performed. Accordingly, there is an orientation programme for imparting knowledge to staff and students by a trained Professor.

These extension activities have created a positive impact on our students. Initially they were shy to speak to strangers. Slowly they have acquired confidence and have begun operating with more self assurance.

National Service scheme: When the students are admitted the programme officer calls for a meeting of all the first years. She explains the ideology of service to society, interaction between society and individual to inculcate leadership skills. The YRC conducts awareness programmes on the principles of voluntary service, health, hygiene and human rights.

Citizen Consumer Club: The coordinator of the Consumer Club also exposes the concepts of consumerisation along with the curriculum. The club arranges an orientation programme. Students are motivated to know and to propagandize the concepts of consumer rights. They are encouraged to become members of consumer club.

3.6.6. Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable projects to our sections of society?

The university NSS unit conducts social surveys which are regulated by a coordinator who allots these projects to our NSS volunteers. These works are completed by our students in an accurate manner and the reports are submitted to the university.

The objectives of the extension programmes in our college are to train students in personality development, inter-personal relationships, team work and leadership skills and service skills.

The institution has given opportunities to many of our first generation learners who use this opportunity as a platform to put up short plays, deliver speeches and acquire confidence. The student volunteers always in charge of discipline in the functions. The empowered students have built the needed leadership skills and have acquired the ability to coordinate with others in working. The students have understood the value of taking up responsibilities.

The Youth Red Cross has empowered students to conduct blood camp and other similar works.

YRC is planning the work ahead and executing it well. Youth Red Cross organizes competitions and encourages students to participate in intercollegiate competition. Theatrical-written-spoken-singing-painting-debating and such skills are sharpened and refined as they take part in competitions. Their communication skills also improve because of these competitions.

The Citizen Consumer Club has become an activity that has attracted lot of students on a voluntary basis as it teaches them their own rights as a citizen of our nation. This knowledge has helped them gain self confidence in their social approach.

All the above service organizations help students to reach out to the underprivileged sections of the society and teach them the value of social responsibilities.

3.6.8. How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourages community participation in its activities?

Our Institution has encouraged to cultivate spirulina as a part of recycling waste water and to provide fodder to the cattle through farmers who invited around Thiruvannamalai District. Our students under ECO club explained the importance of spirulina to the formers.

Spirulina can be used as health food, therapeutic agent, animal feed that increased lactation in cow and buffalo. It also increases the growth rate of Goat and Pigs and increases the meat yield. Fish feed supplemented with spirulina increases growth rate and body weight of fishes.

We have also explained about the importance of vermicomposting, conservation of cultivable land and have distributed earth worms to the farmers nearby.

Mushroom have been cultivated using agro waste in our college premises and has been distributed to the weaker section and under – nourished poor people as a conventional protein source explaining them about its importance.

# **4.4.2.** What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The campus has a designated Engineering Division with a Civil Engineer as its chief, who supervises the maintenance of the infrastructure. It has a separate set of Office staff as well as Maintenance staff, on the basis of the perspective development plan, proposes the infrastructural augmentation needs to the concerned authorities. The college development fund is utilized for maintenance and minor repairs of furniture and equipments. The IQAC prioritizes the activities, estimates the cost and submits it to the head of the institution. The management approves and allocates the funds. An effective monitoring system through various committees ensures the optimal utilization of budget allocated. We have a centralized maintenance department for the entire campus with full time salaried employees and the expenditure is a part of income-expenditure account. Since maintenance is a part of monthly expenditure, a separate fund is not allocated.

Maintenance staff consisting of technically qualified people as mechanics, plumbers, electricians, civil workers, carpenters and painters to look after the maintenance and repair. All equipments in the College are maintained either by Annual Maintenance Contracts or by the visit of service personnel. The Office of the engineering division is in charge of

- > Renewal of building license
- > Renewal of stability certificate for building
- > Renewal of fire safety license
- > Obtaining approval for newly acquired land and plan approval for new buildings
- Maintenance of generators, reverse osmosis water plant facility.
- > Annual electrical inspection work
- ➤ Cleanliness and Maintenance of all buildings and grounds
- ➤ Transport in charge

The laboratories are maintained by the respective Laboratory Assistants under the guidance of the Heads of the Department. Class rooms and rest rooms are maintained clean by the team of menial staff.

Annual maintenance and repair of the infrastructure is taken care by the college in a systematic manner. Day to day maintenance is carried out by the staff appointed for cleaning and maintenance of the building. The laboratory equipments are maintained through College Development Fund. The computers and electronic devices are maintained and repaired through the funds available in the institution. We have a team of qualified technical staff for maintaining computers and networking facilities. Some of the members are stationed in the campus so that they are available at short notice. We have a Manager (Infrastructure Maintenance Department) for the maintenance of the entire campus and the following departments work under him with the salaried staff.

Their services are available throughout the day. Some of these staff stay within the campus.

The college has clear cut mentioned places for the sensitive equipments like electricity generators, water purifiers, chemicals and scientific instruments. The laboratory staff keep a strict vigil regarding the maintenance and upkeep of the scientific instruments and Chemicals. Their repair or replacement or another required upkeep is fully undertaken in their supervision. Similarly, the college electrician and the supporting staff is responsible for the upkeep of electrical equipments and their maintenance. The institution has a tie up with the company from which the RO purifiers were brought and the institution pays AMC to the firm for the regular and routine check up and upkeep of the purifiers. To enrich the infrastructural amenities our institution has recently constructed spacious, aerated and well lited auditorium with the capacity of 2000 viewers.

Scholarships/free ships, admission reservations and progression coaching etc., are provided to students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections. The College gives full assistance for availing post metric and Central Sector scholarships.

No overseas students are studying in our College.

### Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.,

Medical assistance is provided to all the students of Under Graduate and Post Graduate programmes. The sick room is provided in the ground floor. Proper arrangement of drinking water is provided in the College campus.

### Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

The Institution provides training for competitive examinations to help the students to face UPSC Civil Service examinations and SLET, NET examinations of UGC. The Placement Cell of the College makes arrangement for campus recruitment and constantly informing the students about

competitive examination and encourages them to participate in the placement drives organized by other institutions in the locality. The college also invites professionals from the industry which provides regional and global employment opportunities for the students.

### Skill development (spoken English, Computer literacy, etc.)

The language lab provides audio-visual aids and techniques, to improve the communication skills of the students. The English Department conducts Add - on programme on communication skills. The placement cell of the college organizes personality Development programmes. Training is provided to develop leadership qualities, job skills and soft skills. Communicative English has been a part of the curriculum for under graduate programmes .Computer fundamentals are taught to the students and they are given practical training to have hands on experience. Add – on course on basic computer awareness is offered by the Computer Science Department and Commerce Department.

### **Support for slow learners:**

Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners, and weak students. Practical classes are also conducted repeatedly, for the students so as to develop the laboratory skills. Students who have back log of previous semester are encouraged to improve their performance. One to one learning is available and library support is provided through question bank and extension of library working hours are available especially during study holidays. Class tutors and Head of the Departments meet slow learners after the first internal, encourages and motivates them for a better performance. Whenever a slow learner is identified by the class tutors, the mentor teacher gives counselling to them for improvement.

### Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning /corporate/business houses etc.,

Some of the Department Conduct industrial visits to reputed Institute of learning, industries, business houses etc. Project assignments regarding business concepts are undertaken by students of commerce and Management programmes with assistance from corporate houses. Department depute the students to seminars, workshops and cultural fests organized by other institutions. Experts from reputed institutions/industries are invited to share their knowledge and views with the students from time to time.

### **Academic Counselling:**

The college has a Counselling Cell under the supervision of senior teaching faculty. # **5.2.3.** How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and /or towards employment?

The College makes sincere efforts to facilitate student progression to higher level of education and getting suitable placements including commencement of her own entrepreneurial venture, both at Graduate as well as at Post Graduate levels. The career Guidance and Placement Cell of the College acts as a centre for identifying job opportunities and higher education facilities. Students are informed of the reputed higher education institutions and procedures for applying the same. Notification of admission to premier institutions is displayed on the notice board and students are encouraged to apply. From time to time, the Cell makes arrangement for various guest lectures. Eminent personalities from diverse fields of education are invited to interact with the students. The Cell helps students to register their names with the Employment Exchange. This step of College has facilitated the students in identifying better job opportunities. Personality development programmes are also helpful for the student progression to higher level of education or employment.

### 5.2.4. Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The college is committed to bring down the dropout rate. The socioeconomic, cultural and psychological issues contribute the drop out factor. To deal with the socio cultural problems, the Counselling cell and Grievance redress cell address the problems of the students and sometimes parents too. Personally contacting the parents of students who are at the risk of drop out/failure have helped a lot to reduce the dropout rate. Remedial coaching classes for slow learners have been instrumental in considerably reducing the dropout rate of our students and in raising their academic performance. Each department conducts remedial coaching for weaker students and special

counselling classes are given to avoid the problem of drop outs. Free ships and fee concession are extended by the management to the students who are at risk of dropout due to financial problems.





#### 7.1. Environment Consciousness

The campus is in midst green environment with natural resources. The Institution in its practices has always been eco-friendly.

#### 7.1.1. Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

- The students and faculty are encouraged by the NSS unit and the ECO to keep the campus green by planting more trees and making the campus plastic free zone. Though there is no formal green audit system, the entire building of the institution is designed by the architect in considering the maximum utilization of the natural resources. All the classrooms are well constructed with proper ventilation and lighting.
- The Institution believes in creating environmental awareness and promoting greenery.
- "Smoke emission test" for vehicles is being done every six months.

#### 7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Various constructive initiatives are constantly undertaken to make the campus eco-friendly. A few of the initiatives are taken to make the campus eco-friendly are listed below:

#### **Energy conservation:**

- Awareness programs are very often conducted for the students with the guidance of electricity department.
- The traditional lighting systems are replaced with CFL lighting system.
- Students are motivated to switch off the fans and lights whenever there is no necessity.
- The drivers are given special training programs to save fuel and they are motivated by appreciation and honors by the management in midst of students and in turn students are also motivated to save energy.

#### Use of renewable energy:

- Biomass wastages are used for steamers in hostels for cooking.
- There is a proposal to install solar panels at roofing and street lights.

#### Water harvesting:

• We have rain water harvesting in our campus to maintain ground water table.

#### **Check dam construction:**

Not carried out

#### **Efforts for Carbon neutrality:**

- Students are encouraged to use bicycles rather than automobiles and also college provides mass transport system.
- To contribute to low carbon impact, we are using refilled cartridges.
- Burning of dry leaves, papers and bio-degradable waste are not allowed rather we burry it in a pit and using it as manure.
- "Smoke emission test" for vehicles is being carried out once in six months to monitor and reduce carbon content.

#### **Plantation:**

• Students are encouraged to plant more trees in and outside the college campus and the same is carried as the part of club activities.

#### Hazardous waste management:

Efforts have been taken periodically to minimize waste generation in labs

- The equipments are sterilized by means of autoclave, hot air oven and fumigation.
- Biomedical wastes are incinerated.
- Chemicals are properly diluted with 1-10% solution of bleach and the same are disposed.
- Expired chemicals are returned to the suppliers for disposal.
- Creating environmental awareness by lectures on hazardous waste management using projectors by some case studies like Hiroshima-Nagasaki nuclear bombs, Bhopal gas tragedy, Chernobyl nuclear reactor exposure and recent Fukishima daichi reactor on natural disaster.

#### **E-waste management:**

• The institution has taken adequate initiatives to manage E-wastes which are collected in a systematic manner and safely disposed to scrap dealers periodically.

#### 7.2. Innovations:

The Institution is geared to promote an ambience of creativity innovation and improving quality.

## 7.2.1. Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- Wi-Fi connection established in nodal areas to equip e-based teaching and learning.
- CCTV cameras have been fixed for monitoring as a precaution to protect and generate feeling of safety for staffs and students.
- Library is now getting access to e-resources through programme entitled "National Library and Information Services infrastructure for Scholarly Content (N-LIST)" funded by the Ministry of Human Resource Development under its National Mission on Education through ICT. The N-LIST project provides access to e-resources to students, researchers and faculties.
- Students are encouraged to view VYAS live channel regularly. NPTEL video classes from IIT professors—are being projected to the students and are carried out as the part of creative learning methodologies and student centred approaches.
- English communication skills have been promoted in midst of students by means of English lab.
- The departments have been motivated by the management to organize National and International Conferences in the College and journals are been published by inviting papers from various participants from other colleges.
- Staffs and students are motivated to upgrade themselves with NET and SLET are being organised with the help of experts.
- Experiments beyond the syllabus are being conducted in the labs in order to give a wider exposure to the students with regard to their subject.
- As part of the student's health consciousness, the management has installed RO drinking water facilities in the campus.

- The Napkin destroyer has been installed in the campus so as to burn and rewind the napkins.
- Most of the students are from economically backward and from rural areas. They are
  motivated to make use of modern technologies and all the students are given training to
  operate computers, create e-mail ids of their own and browse study materials via internet
  classes.

- "Sewage treatment plant" project has been carried out to recycle the waste water and reuse it for watering the plants in the campus.

#### POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

Sri Akilandeswari Women's College, Wandiwash is affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore and has undergone the Ist Cycle of NAAC Accreditation in the year 2006 and B+ status was granted to this Institution. The Peer team members of the Ist Accreditation cycle have given very good Assessment remarks to the Institution.

The evaluation report enlisted many highlights of our strengths. The recommendations were less in number during the First Accreditation when compared with the strengths. The institution has seriously viewed the remarks to rectify the weakness. The Management and the Governing Council of our college implemented many reforms to strengthen our quality sustenance.

After the Ist cycle of Accreditation, our institution has developed much in terms of curriculum. Being an affiliated college, we follow the stipulated syllabi and curricular modules of the University. Previously we followed the Semester system of curriculum, but now we follow the CBCS pattern of curriculum.

The CBCS pattern of syllabus is much enriched and more advanced in standard. Our institution is strictly adhering to development programme options. In CBCS syllabi, the students have academic flexibility in selecting their Elective subjects and also Non-Major Elective subjects.

Regarding the curriculum development, it is noteworthy to mention that we have grown very fast and occupied a top level 'Benchmark' in this Thiruvannamalai District within in a short span of period. It is very evident that, our Management pays much attention to keep the high standard and the quality sustenance and the management believes that the curricular aspects of our institution is sound enough in the "Post Accreditation Period".

The performance analysis of our students is good and is increasing every year and our students are fetching not less than 15 University Ranks every year. Performance wise calibrating, our students are always on par with city students in learning and even excel them in terms of knowledge resources.

We have appointed adequate number of teachers with highest qualifications. The efforts made by our teachers to improve the curricular aspects are remarkable and only minimum number of candidates produce negative results. Our teachers are very devoted to teaching and very much dedicated to uplift the students.
